CALLS FOR EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST – HEALTH PROMOTION CAPACITY BUILDING**

The Lowitja Institute is seeking suitably qualified applicants to undertake a scoping study (Stage 1) and Stages 2–4 of a work program to build the health promotion capacity of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people:

Stage 1 – Scoping Study of Health Promotion Tools for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People (closing date for eoi is 12 September 2011)

- Review the literature and health promotion programs to identify current health promotion tools for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
- Make recommendations about possible gaps and opportunities for the development of health promotion tools.

Stage 2–4 From Tools to Training (closing date for eoi is 26 September 2011)

- Adapt available tools or where necessary develop new appropriate tools for health promotion.
- Develop a training program to use the tools, and train people to use those tools for health promotion.
- Pilot and evaluate the use of the tools by trained health promotion officers, aiming to produce a suite of tested tools for health promotion for use by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and communities.

Keeping Strong is a flyer which has been produced by *beyondblue: the national depression initiative* to provide culturally-appropriate information for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people on the signs and symptoms of depression and ways to find help and healing. 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Facilitating communication between health providers and pregnant women

Researchers at the Menzies School of Health Research in Darwin have developed a set of resources to improve communication with pregnant women on screening tests for fetal anomalies such as Down syndrome.

The research was initiated after data showed very low uptake of these tests in the Northern Territory compared with other states in Australia. The study investigated Aboriginal women's views about the screening and diagnostic tests, and found women of all ages across the urban and remote study sites wanted more information about these tests. The research also identified many logistical barriers to offering the tests, and that health providers found it challenging to discuss complex topics such as 'risk'.

A set of resources was developed to improve communication around fetal anomaly screening. These include an illustrated flipbook for health providers, a take home booklet for parents, a DVD in Yolngu language, and posters on folic acid supplementation and the screening process.
